ABOUT THE BACHELOR OF APPLIED ARTS AND SCIENCE

The Bachelor of Applied Arts and Science (BAAS) degree is a designated pathway for graduates of an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) from a regionally accredited institution who seek to supplement their technical skills with knowledge and experience that can prepare them for managerial or supervisory roles. The BAAS program allows students to continue to a baccalaureate degree without significant loss of technical credit. The technical credits applied towards the BAAS fulfill this degree only and are not intended to be transferred into a traditional BA or BS degree program.

Admission Requirements

AAS degree or equivalent is required from an organized technical program completed at a community college.

BAAS Program Requirements

- 42 semester credit hours of Core Curriculum
- **33** semester credit hours awarded from an organized technical program completed at an accredited community college. (AAS degree or equivalent is required.)
- **15** hours of upper-division of foundation courses intended to provide BAAS students with a background in writing and communication strategies and skill sets.
- **30** hours of course work (minimum 24 upper-division hours) to make up **two 15-hour** concentrations.

Concentrations

The BAAS concentrations will help students combine their technical skills and experience to grow professional skills and meet the demand for leadership of highly technical professionals in the workplace. AAS in Pastry graduates following this pathway will have the option to select from the following concentrations:

- 1. Business concentration (Entrepreneurship, General Business, or Management) and
- 2. Communication Studies concentration or Food Culture and Nutrition concentration

POLICIES

Term of Agreement: This agreement is consistent with the 2022-2023 UTEP University Catalog. A student must complete all requirements within seven (7) years or be subject to the degree requirements of a subsequent catalog. The seven-year period begins with the year the catalog was issued, regardless of the student's first semester of enrollment. A student transferring from a Texas two-year institution can select a catalog that was in effect prior to the first semester of enrollment at UTEP, as long as the student was following UTEP's degree plan while enrolled at the community college. In the event that a student does not complete the program within seven years, they may be required to have their credits reevaluated using the requirements of the current articulation guide. Evaluation and Transfer of Credit: Once a student is admitted to UTEP as a transfer student, the Office of Undergraduate Admissions will provide an evaluation of courses that are transferable to the University. Acceptance of transfer credit by UTEP does not constitute approval of the credit for use toward a particular degree program. The applicability of transfer courses toward a degree is determined by the academic dean or the advisor in one's major or his or her designate. A maximum of 66 semester hours of credit from two-year lowerdivision institutions is applicable toward a degree at UTEP. Core Curriculum: Students who transfer without completing the core curriculum at another Texas institution of higher education, but who have completed blocks within the core, shall receive credit in UTEP's core curriculum for each of the blocks successfully (C or better) completed in the core curriculum of the sending institution. If a Revised 8/30/22

student has successfully, (C or better) completed the 42-hour core at another Texas institution of higher education, that core shall be substituted for The University of Texas at El Paso's core curriculum. Such a transfer student shall receive credit for each block within the core curriculum and shall not be required to take additional courses to satisfy UTEP's core curriculum. However, courses listed in UTEP's core curriculum can be required as a prerequisite to a course or as a degree requirement for the major.
